Commitment to Sustainable Development

- Technip's professional activities are governed by a set of 4 core values. These values create an Ethics Culture across the Group.

- Technip supports and promotes the 10 universal principles of the UN Global Compact
- In 2015, Technip received the Bronze Medal in the Yearbook of RobecoSAM, confirming our status as one of the sustainability leaders in our industry which is also reflected by the inclusion of our Group in the Dow Jones Sustainability Indices (DJSI) since 2001.
- In 2013, the leading European CSR rating agency VIGEO positioned Technip at very high rank in its sector.

Empowering self-sustainability of an indigenous community

In Malaysia, in 2013 an initiative combining environmental, economic and social awareness was developed with an indigenous fishing community living in the vicinity of the Technip manufacturing center.

- Johor area is very rich in terms of biodiversity (mangroves, birds, fishes, etc.). This natural environment and subsequently the livelihood of the indigenous fishing community, was threatened by industrial developments as for example intensive construction projects.



The objective was to build with the community a self-sustaining activity through the development of eco-tourism business.

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Empowering self-sustainability of an indigenous community

- Technip's Kuala Lumpur operating centre managed to provide 15 people of the community with a specialist training course turning them into eco-guides.
- These people learned how to protect nature and the global eco-system, and thus to preserve their threatened culture and heritage while becoming economically independent.
- The training course was founded by Technip.

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ACHIEVEMENTS AND FOLLOW UP

The progress of the eco-tourism business of the local community is permanently monitored and followed up by the Kuala Lumpur operating centre. As per today, the status is as follows :

- **The eco-tourism is still on-going, with an average of 3 to 4 trips per month for the tourists/visitors which provide reasonable income for the eco-guides**
- **The eco-guides charge RM 250 per boat which can safely accommodate up to 7-8 people per trip**
- **Most of the bookings are coming from Singapore and Penang**
- **High demand in Sept/ Oct last year 2014 which coincide with the school holidays and fairly good weather conditions**
